### **FUNDING – APPLICATIONS WITH CLOSING DATES**

#### **Armed Forces Covenant Fund Trust – Removing Barriers to Family Life**

This programme is about supporting Armed Forces Families facing challenges. Large grants will help to address substantial challenges; providing funding for transformative ideas. Medium grants will support projects that make a proven difference to Armed Forces Families and will support existing work. There is an overall budget of £7.5 million. The programme will make grants to projects where they can see that the project is addressing a clear need, and where they think the idea will be of practical benefit to Armed Forces Families. The focus of the project should be on supporting the family; rather than serving personnel or veterans. For a medium strand grant you complete a single application form and for a large grant you complete an Expression of Interest form. and communities, innovating for the sector or at least for your organisation.
